- Amanda doesn't care a bit what her mother says to her.
- She is again in the world of dreams and fantasy.
- She prefers to be an orphan than living such a life.
- She wants to roam around the streets freely and aimlessly.
- She wants to walk on the soft dust with her bare feet.
- The pressing of the feet will create designs on the soft dust.
- She loves silence, and freedom is the sweetest thing that she values in her life.


